UK seaside resorts



Location

There are many seaside resorts in the United Kingdom that have been popular for many years. In Victorian times, people would travel to the seaside to enjoy activities, such as a puppet show, walk along the promenade or to go sea bathing. The Victorians believed that the sea air was good for you and that sea bathing would make you healthy. The coastline around the UK is where you can find seaside resorts. There are many seaside resorts around the world that people visit for their holidays. Some have warmer dimates. In the past, beaches were much cleaner because there was a lot less litter than we have now.





Visiting Beaches

The seaside can be warm, wet, and windy. Tourists go on holiday to the seaside for the fresh air, beaches, and warm weather. There is always plenty to do at the seaside, like building sandcastles, paddling in the sea and donkey rides. It is important to stay safe in the sun at the seaside by wearing a hat, wearing sun cream, and drinking water. Coastguards and lifeboats are an emergency service and keep people safe at the seaside.


Seaside Towns

Amusement park	A large outdoor area with fairground rides, shows, and other attractions.	
Bay	Part of the coast where the land curves in and is surrounded by the sea on three sides.	
Cliff	Steep rock close to the sea.

Human feature	A feature that has been made or changed by humans.	
Lighthouse	A tower with a bright light that warns ships about rocks or other dangers .
