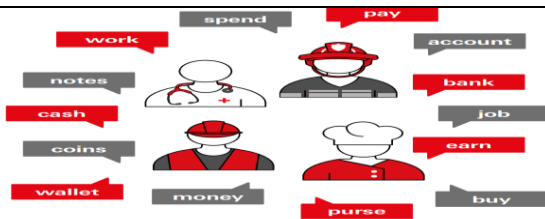
To support reading fluency, practise high-frequency words. These are words that we don't 'sound out', simply see it - say it. You could make some flashcards and stick them up or play a game to practise.
